## **Calendar Description**

This course uses the Environmental Science Seminar series as a foundation for exploring established and emerging topics in the field. In addition to scheduled class time, students must attend the seminars and meet with speakers to discuss their work. Students also become directly involved in the hosting of speakers.

- Enhance critical thinking through the discussion and analysis of literature and seminar content
- Facilitate discussion between graduate students and scientists, managers and other practitioners in the field of environmental science
- Allow students to explore areas of interest through the identification and hosting of authorities on subjects relevant to their area(s) of study.
