Future Students Office & Cplul'kw'ten

A) Future Students Welcome Centre
 If you're a Canadian or permanent resident looking to study on campus, the team in the Future Students Office is here to help you along your journey to becoming a TRU student.

B) Cplul'kw'ten
 Affectionately also referred to as "House 5" or "The Gathering Place", this space is intended as a home away from home for Indigenous students, but all are welcome. Cplul'kw'ten means the Gathering Place in Secwepemctsin. The word was brought to TRU by Bonaparte Elders.

Ken Lepin Science Building (S) & Gymnasium

A) Ken Lepin Science Building
 Home to the Faculty of Science, offering hands on experience in state of the art labs. The Respiratory Therapy Program, the only program of its kind in BC, is also located in this building with its a full respiratory clinic.

B) Gymnasium
 Commonly known to students as the Old Gym, the gymnasium houses TRU Recreation. TRU Recreation runs intramural programs and free recreation classes including Yoga, Pilates, and Boot Camps.

This building used to house TRU's main library, but now houses a number of offices including the All My Relations Research Centre. This space is newly renovated and includes many study spaces and free use of computers for students.

Culinary Arts Training Centre and Retail Meat Store

A) Culinary Arts Training Centre
 Also known as CATC, this building is home to the Culinary Arts Program. The Scratch Café is open to the public for breakfast or lunch during Culinary Arts instructional periods—and has great food at reasonable prices.

B) Retail Meat Store
 Retail Meat Store is home to our retail meat-cutting program—the only one of its kind in British Columbia. During instructional periods the program operates a storefront and sells a selection of cuts in addition to sausages, beef jerky, and seafood.

International Building (IB)

Named in recognition of the more than 3,500 international students from over 100 countries, IB has lecture halls, study spaces, computer labs, and a working observatory. IB houses Study Abroad and TRU World—our International Department—which offers international student support.

Arts and Education (AE)

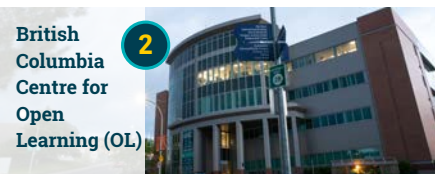
Arts and Education is home to the Faculty of Arts and Faculty of Education and Social Work. The building is mostly comprised of classrooms and a few lecture halls, though there are computer labs and a language lab as well. Out front is a solar compass that harnesses energy too!

Kamloops Lookout & North Tower

A) Lookout
 Campus is on the traditional, and unceded territory of T'kemlups te Secwepemc. We are located in the heart of the City of Kamloops, close to many amenities. Here, you can see the reason why the City was named after the Secwepemc word meaning "where the rivers meet."

B) North Tower Residence
 This residence has 2- and 4-bedroom suites with a shared kitchenette including a full-size fridge and microwave, bathrooms, and common areas. Each room has furnished private rooms.

We are the BC Centre for Open Learning. Open Learning has been offering distance education for more than 40 years. Students can obtain certificates, diplomas, undergraduate and graduate degrees, and post-baccalaureate credentials through Open Learning.

NPH is home to TRU's Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Master of Nursing and Health Care Assistant programs. This building features four high tech simulation labs equipped with computerized mannequins, hospital and home-visit lab space, classrooms, and student lounges.



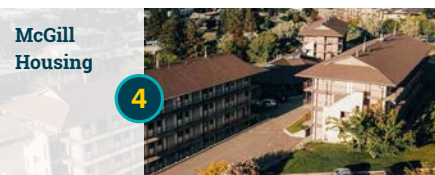

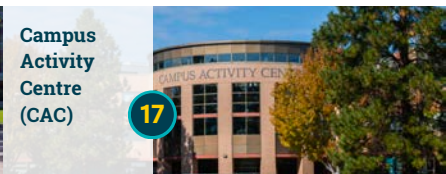

Old Main (OM) & Student Street

Old Main is the oldest building on campus, and was the sole building when the institution was initially founded as a college. Campus Commons

Campus Commons is where many events on campus take place throughout the academic school year. It was also designed to represent Kamloops from an aerial perspective with the rolling hills and the pathway to represent the North and South Thompson Rivers coming together.

Campus Activity Centre (CAC)

There are no classrooms located here, but there are great study and hangout spaces, food services, and the bookstore. The Students' Union (TRUSU) is also located here.



Did you spot Sk'elep?
 Sk'elep, meaning coyote, represents one of many Indigenous efforts across campus. Sk'elep, located on top of the House of Learning, purposefully faces the East where the sun rises to symbolize our commitment to realizing potential and the opportunities higher education can provide. It was sculpted by Artist John McEwen and made out of metal stars.

Trades and Technology Centre (TT)

This building supports a variety of trades training including job retraining, foundation training, and Red Seal apprenticeship training. The centre houses fully-equipped shops— representing carpentry, welding, piping, heavy duty mechanics, electrical and more.



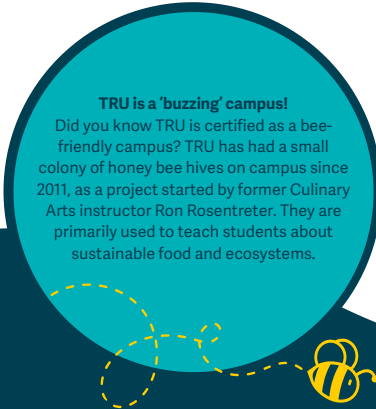
